Who we are

The Nest Collective is a registered charity that desires to see all New Zealand babies given a great start in life. We provide baby essentials to families in need.

We provide packs of new, pre-loved, handcrafted and repurposed essentials including clothing, toys, nappies, bedding, books and more.

We have branches in Auckland, Gisborne, Kāpiti, Wellington and Christchurch. These branches rely on donations (both physical and financial) to provide pēpi packs to families for free via social workers, kaiāwhina, midwives, nurses and other local community partners.

We began preparations in 2022 to open our most southern branch, Ōtepoti Dunedin. The branch will launch publicly in 2023 to support Dunedin babies and their whānau.

Why we do it



More than **ONE IN TEN** New Zealand children live in households reporting material hardship.

Approximately 187,300 CHILDREN (16.3%) are living in INCOME POVERTY.



Almost **THREE IN FOUR HOUSEHOLDS** in hardship report being very limited in their ability to purchase clothes.



Children living in areas with the highest deprivation scores are **TWICE AS LIKELY TO BE ADMITTED TO HOSPITAL** than children in areas with the lowest scores.



Sudden unexpected death in infancy is a leading cause of **PREVENTABLE DEATH** in New Zealand babies. The ideal place for a baby to sleep is in their own safe sleeping space, on a safe mattress, with safe bedding.



Many families face **IMPOSSIBLE FINANCIAL DECISIONS** such as choosing between paying the power bill or buying warm clothing for their children.



Not having enough resources to support a baby's wellbeing, such as nappies and warm clothes, creates stress, as evidenced through **HIGHER RATES OF POSTPARTUM DEPRESSION** among low-income mothers.



MATERIAL RESOURCES ARE CRITICAL to providing children with an opportunity to reach their health, educational and socio-behavioural potential.

The evidence is clear: what happens in the first years of life impacts children's life-long trajectories. Helping families is the right thing to do and research shows that early investment in children pays off in the long term for families and society.

What is in a pack?

Every pack contains the essentials that a baby needs for its wellbeing and safety from birth to age one and often beyond. Every item included serves this purpose and our packs were created through consultation with social workers, community partners and experts.

Our packs are designed to include the critical necessities to reduce material hardship. We individually assess the needs of each baby because every family we help is facing their own unique challenges.

A standard baby pack includes over 150 items (new, pre-loved, handcrafted and repurposed essentials) and costs us \$165. This includes all associated pack costs including packaging, printing and pack items.

Our packs contain clothing (prem to size 1), bedding, nappies and wipes, toys, books, toiletries, safety items, parent/caregiver items and more.

We purchase reusable nappies, thermometers, sunscreen, sleeping bags and books at reduced cost. We are gifted a number of new items for free including nappy balm, bath products, reusable maternity pads, breast pads and handcrafted items. These are included alongside donations of pre-loved baby items.

The Nest Collective harnesses the generosity of the community to supply the essential items families require to meet the needs of their tamariki from day one.









Who we work with

We work alongside social workers, kaiāwhina, midwives and nurses from over 50 community partners. This allows our community partners to focus on their primary role, while we provide the material items to give pēpi the best start in life. It also means that we are helping those most in need whilst ensuring the whole whānau are well supported. Our community partners include the following:

Our story so far

The Nest Collective is an incorporated Charitable Trust that launched in February 2021.

Our branches began life as Little Sprouts Charitable Trust and when that charity closed The Nest Collective was created to ensure the needs in our communities didn't go unmet.

In December 2022, The Nest Collective consisted of five branches; Auckland, Gisborne, Kāpiti, Wellington and Christchurch. As a result of COVID-19 challenges, our Waikato branch closed in 2022 and all community

partner pack requests continue to be fulfilled by other branches.

Our newest branch, Dunedin is set up and ready to launch in 2023.

The majority of our Branch Managers, volunteers and crafters were long-term supporters of Little Sprouts and now volunteer with The Nest Collective. Our Board and Management Team bring fresh, professional expertise and strong governance.

The Board currently consists of seven people and is made up of several professionals who are all experts in their chosen fields. The Board includes Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and Branch Representative Trustee.

The Board holds a united vision and works hard to meet The Nest Collective's strategic goals. The Board's expertise ensures a focus on strong governance and leadership.

Our national Management team consists of three Managers who focus on national operations and supporting each branch.

Each branch runs on the energy and dedication of volunteers. A Branch Manager in each location oversees the team of volunteers who contribute to each branch.

The Nest Makers

From Gore to Northland, and everywhere in between - our crafters knit, crochet and sew to create new or refresh old items into beautiful, hand-crafted quality baby items. These crafters ('The Nest Makers') volunteer their time, skill, yarn or fabric to ensure each pack includes quilts, change mats, play mats, burp cloths, reusable breast pads, clothing, bedding and much more.

The Nest Makers collectively save numerous kilograms of garments, fabrics and yarn from landfills - unpicking items to repurpose them, mending holes and giving new life to previously worn or unsuitable items. We gratefully receive fabric offcuts and sample items from local businesses that are able to be upcycled into quality baby items - all thanks to our crafters.

Our packs would simply not be possible without each and every crafter who donates. To those that have donated one or two items through to those who donate piles each week - we are so grateful for every single item that you put so much aroha into. Ngā mihi nui.


Ongoing COVID-19 restrictions, meant that at times our branches worked together nationally to provide packs when other regions could not.

MEET THE NEED

2022

We connected with our existing community partners in our current regions and increased awareness of our service. This resulted in new community partners and a 47% increase in pack numbers in 2022 compared to 2021.

PREPARE TO GROW

2023

Broaden The Nest Collective's geographical footprint by preparing to establish new branches in areas where there is the greatest need. Also develop a framework for branch hubs that serve more areas across Aotearoa.

DEVELOP HUBS FOR GREATER REACH

Reach out to more community partners and broaden the areas that we serve by establishing branch hubs. Increase our focus on underserved communities including rural areas by utilising transport from our regional hubs.

Key challenges

FUNDING STABILITY

We have concentrated on grant funding to cover our costs which has been successful in 2022. However long term this is not guaranteed. Therefore having more stable and multiple funding streams would be hugely beneficial.

DONATION SUPPLY

Many charities are working to help families and meet their needs in Aotearoa. Whilst positive, this also means there is competition for financial and physical item donations to fill packs.

VOLUNTEER NUMBERS

Volunteers are the backbone of our charity, however we will experience fluctuations in resourcing by relying on an unpaid workforce.

ITEM SUPPLY

Sourcing consistent supply of items we need for our packs continues to be a challenge.











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Chairman's Report

The Nest Collective NZ Charitable Trust For the year ended 31 December 2022

We are delighted to be reporting on our second successful year as The Nest Collective. It has been another very challenging but rewarding year.

Achievements in 2022

We were able to meet 100% of pack requests in 2022, despite the challenges presented by COVID and the ongoing cost of living crisis. We achieved a 47% increase in the number of packs provided compared to 2021 and met the milestone of 1,000 packs. The 722 packs contained over 105,000 essential items collected at 52 drop-off points, supported by 52 community partners, 100 volunteers, and over 900 crafters.

A major source of our success in 2022 was the willingness and ability of our branches to support each other, and the very close and supportive relationship that exists between the branch managers and the small national management team. This enabled team morale to remain high through trying times.

We also kept strengthening the platform for our operations. Examples of this effort include IT systems improvements, expansions in the physical spaces available for our branches, and ongoing efforts to increase the number of volunteers and community partners.

We are incredibly proud of our team across the country and I would like to take this opportunity to thank our management team: Natalia; Naomi and Amelia, for their valuable efforts to meet the organisation's goal of building the foundations of the organisation to ensure a platform for growth.

I would also like to thank our hard-working branch managers, branch volunteers and crafters. Without your generosity and kindness towards your community, none of this would be possible.

In June 2022 we decided to shut down the Waikato branch due to a lack of volunteers. Despite this, we have been able to continue supporting our current community partners and deliver couriered packs to these families from our other branches. We also continued our support around the country to all regions through our agreement with Oranga Tamariki. Unfortunately, funding has not continued for this, but we have signed up community partners as part of our network.

Management and governance

The Board, consisting of seven people who are all experts in their fields, focused on strong governance, funding and strategy aligned with The Nest Collective's vision. The Board includes these formal roles: Chairperson; Secretary; Treasurer; and Branch representative Trustee (representing all branches).

I am also excited to announce that Wendy Thompson, previous General Manager of Bellyful New Zealand has recently replaced me as the Chairperson of The Nest Collective. It is always very rewarding and reassuring to be able to hand over responsibilities for such an important cause to someone who is much more able than oneself to take the organisation to a higher level. I wish Wendy and The Nest Collective the very best for the future.

Priorities for 2023

It is not my place, as the retiring Chairperson, to communicate the organisations' priorities for the year ahead. What I can report on are the decisions we made regarding our future strategy, in the middle of 2022.

- We will be opening a new branch in Dunedin in the middle of this year (2023).
- To enhance the effectiveness, reach, and efficiency of our operations, we intend to convert our existing branches into centres for regional hubs, so that we can provide packs to remote, rural or under-served areas through the use of courier services.
- We will continue our hard work of establishing supply agreements for all items we need to purchase so that we can minimise supply chain risks a lesson we have learned from our COVID experience.
- We will continue moving our branches into better fit-for-purpose locations, enabling more enjoyment, safety and productivity for volunteers.

Challenges

Funding is still a challenge with most of our funding coming through grants - however, a big part of our new strategy is putting more emphasis on marketing, spreading the word and fundraising efforts both nationally and locally. So far, we have mainly and successfully concentrated on grant funding to cover our costs. However, this is not guaranteed, and it can be affected by events such as COVID. We need to ensure stable funding supported by multiple funding streams.

In terms of *donation supply*, many charities are working to help families and meet the huge need in Aotearoa. Whilst this is very positive, it also means there is competition for financial and physical item donations to fill packs.

Volunteers are the backbone of our charity. Given changing economic and social circumstances, we will be experiencing fluctuations in resourcing that rely so heavily on an unpaid workforce.

Finally, regarding *item supply* and associated costs, COVID was a most unfortunate reminder of the vulnerability of our operations to supply disruptions and/or unforeseen price increases for the purchased items.

These are all surmountable challenges. I am very confident that The Nest Collective will continue facing and overcoming them through strong governance and management, strongly motivated by a most worthy cause which has the support of the empathetic and generous people of Aotearoa New Zealand.

Our entity relies heavily on volunteers and donated goods. Volunteers assist by collecting donations, going through the offerings, and assembling our packs and clothing bundles for the families. Over 90% of our packs are filled with donated items and crafted items by our Nest Makers group. Our volunteers also manage the branches, communicate with charity partners, and organise fundraising events.

Description of Entity's Outcomes

Our entity's outcomes directly reflect the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

We hope to use our values of collaboration, integrity, sustainability, equity and manaakitanga to achieve our mission for Aotearoa's families.

Description and Quantification of the Entity's Outputs

In 2022 we provided 722 packs to families across Aotearoa and all ethnic groups, which is a 50% increase from 2021. 53% of our packs supported Māori and Pasifika families, 54% supported single mothers and 40% to caregivers under 25.

Additional Output Measures

The Nest Collective understands the value of its work in aiding our most vulnerable members, and the continuation of the effects of COVID and the cost of living crisis is having a huge impact on our community. Despite many challenges over the past few years we have been able to meet every pack request we received by working as a team across the country and provided the service many families desperately needed during these difficult times. We also changed the way we had been delivering packs, and started to use a courier to meet the need.

We are very proud of our ability to keep up with the huge increase in demand and adapt as a team.
